The piece will be officially opened for public viewing today in the new village square located on Suncoast Blvd off David Low Way, Marcoola.

Ms Eisler was commissioned by the Sunshine Coast Council to complete the work following a long tendering process that involved going up against some of the most renowned artists in Queensland.

The creation took five months to complete and Ms Eisler said it was one of her favourite pieces to date.

"I had a good idea of what I wanted to do, and the Sunshine Coast Council was very excited by my vision for the piece," she said.

"It was a long process in getting it completed, but well worth the effort and I couldn't be happier with how it turned out."

Ms Eisler said she wanted to encapsulate every facet of the Coolum region.

"When people think of Marcoola they think of the beach immediately, and the beach is an important part of the place, but there is a lot more to it," she
